July 12, 6-8pm What's Going On? – Alan Burgess, Creative Director of Benduka Arts, Los Angeles, CA

Educator and activist will lead the conversation on *Why Do I Need To Learn All This Black Stuff*. These turbulent cultural times demand that educators, parents, and on the most basic level, human beings in America start to do the work we have to do. This session will connect the dots between the history of Blacks in America and the fulfillment of our promise as a nation that everyone is created equally. All the buzz around "critical race theory" and

"cultural relevant" methods of teaching are hot button issues that will factor into this forum. This education system has failed to use a social justice model for creating a more democratic society. Everyone will be given the opportunity to be heard. Burgess will not be preaching to the audience, instead he will ask tough questions and help develop a course of action. What we're calling "Black stuff," is really EVERYONE'S STUFF.

July 13, 6-8pm Manifest Destiny to White Supremacy & Microaggressions Candace Kelley, J.D., M.S.

Candace Kelley is a legal scholar, a Communications Law Professor at Rowan University and Broadcast Journalist. She will lead the conversation on white supremacy as an ideological driver of the U.S., white liberalism and microaggressions that continue to shape America. How do these psychological slings erode the quality of one's life experience and what is the root cause? This highly interactive session will challenge your beliefs and requires that you participate by giving your opinions, so that you can then go out in the world and participate in your daily interactions with others to reshape social inequities.

The TRUTH of the Matter

Burgess will peel back the onion and get at the crux of EDUCATION FOR WHOM AND FOR WHAT? Does social justice have a place in public education? Let's find out why it does. The works of writer and activist, James Baldwin, when he points to the rage that African American people, particularly males, endure having to live between two worlds. Other literary figures will be explored and held up as useful resources for personal gain, as well as for educators.
